

Locally owned colt wins Breeders Crown

## Grant's Bettors Delight plays the spoiler

native — confirmed that his elimination win in national and track record time of 1:51.3 was no fluke as he and driver Mike Lachance upset undefeated favourite Real Desire (trained by Campbellville's Blair Burgess) to win the twoyear-old colt pace at the 16th annual Breeders Crown.

## Great finish

Trained by Cambridge's Scott McEnemy, Bettors Delight hauled down Real Desire and Pro Bono Best in mid-stretch to take the seven race — and also the

most lucrative at \$871,475 — in a sizzling 1:52.4.

The one-and-one-quarter length victory was his fourth in eight starts.

With Daniel Dube in the bike, Gallo Blue Chip — the 1-2 choice - simply cashiered the field, taking charge past the quarter and widening to defeat nine rivals, winning by nearly eight

lengths in 1:51.1. Longshot George Scooter out finished On Line Service for second spot.

Overall, Trottin' Trevor Ritchie was the standout — winning three events in the eight-race, \$5.7 million extravaganza to tie John Campbell for most single-season driver wins at the Breeders Crown.

The Ontario Jockey Club regular began the night by taking the two-year-old filly trot with Syrinx Hanover, who grabbed the lead midway through and held on for a Breeders Crown and Canadian record of 1:55.66.

From there, Ritchie made a strong late charge with Banker Hall to win the Two-Year-Old Colt Trot — again establishing a Canadian and Crown benchmark of 1:56.2 - and then combined with longshot Aviano to win the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot in an even 1:56.

Meanwhile, Milton's Chris Christoforou - arguably the most accomplished driver over the past two years — had six rides Friday but failed to reached the winner's circle.

He came close on two occassions, taking third-place honours in the Three-Year-Old Colt Pace and Two-Year-Old Filly pace with Victory Party and Electrical Art respectively.

Next up at Mohawk is the Ontario Sires Stakes Super Final next — for top two and three-year-olds — this Saturday.
