Slow start for Reding

The Royals' shooting seemed cursed for much of the first quarter, as they got in good position for shots but were having a devil of a time getting them to go in.

Amy Prisniak, BR's bedazzling point guard, finally ended the frightful scoring slump when she went to the foul line and sunk two. Then the Royals did a good job of masking their intentions on an inbound play and Chantal Desroches shelled out a goodie of a pass to Sarah Venema under the basket to tie the game.

Leslie Hicks cast a spell over BR to end the first quarter by scoring five points and gathering in at least that many rebounds to lead the Spartans to an 11-6 lead.

The Royals came back from the dead in the second quarter — with Prisniak, Eva Sitarz, Joanna Sitarz and a blood thirsty Carolyn Coates all scoring before Laura Wellstead, number 13 for the Spartans, had a run of good luck and rattled off two baskets from long range.

Michelle Merritt also sank one from quite a distance out, which appeared to be the Spartans' strength. They rarely drove to the basket, but most of the time were

Reding went into the second half with a 19-17 lead, with Sitarz continuing to have a monster of a game.

One time she was mistaken for a pumpkin head when she was hit in the back of the noggin on an errant pass as she ran up court, and one blood-curdling free throw attempt seemed almost to be closer to her own basket than Drury's.

The Royals put a stake through the heart of the Spartans early in the fourth quarter when Alicia New put on her Superwoman costume and displayed an eerie scoring touch. She scored eight straight points, most of them on sweet handouts from Prisniak, and put Bishop Reding well ahead by a 36-25 score.

The Spartans woke up and returned from the land of the zombies, fighting valiantly to recover from the nightmare, but the closest they could come was seven points.

The problem for them was their outside shooting, which just died after being so effective earlier in the game.

The Royals appeared to be allowing them the shot as long as they didn't try to penetrate their zone. Arbuckle led E.C. in scoring, followed by Jukes, who came close to casting a deadly pall over the Royals, with shots that just refused to fall.

The two teams won't have to wait for next Halloween for their rematch, as they face each other tonight in the Aldershot Basketball Tournament.
