New meeting location Local woman is organizing Aboriginal music festival

Campbellville's Barbara Croll is quite serious about breaking down barriers between people of Aboriginal descent and those of other cultures.

But that doesn't mean she can't have a little fun while doing it.

To that end, the rural composer, and former member of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, has organized the first annual Aboriginal Music Days 2000.

The inaugural event — open to everyone, regardless of race or creed — will be held Thursday and Friday at the University of Toronto.

A full slate of activities will fill the two days. Included will be a host of entertainment — music and dancing — as well as traditional workshops, lectures and a panel discussion entitled "Misappropriation or Misunderstanding" Thursday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. at University College.

"The idea is to try and break down some of the barriers between natives and people of other cultures in an educational and entertainment manner," said Ms Croll, whose mother is Odawa Indian and late father was Scottish.

The local musician will not be performing herself, although one of her compositions 'Naaawashkosiw', which loosely translated means In The Middle Of The Meadow, will be.
