Milton's AA juveniles ran their win streak to three games at Memorial Arena Saturday.

But the only similarity between this latest triumph and the two that preceded it was the victory itself.

Meanwhile, Marco LaBello and Ricky McAneney also dented the twine. Drawing a couple of helpers each were gritty spark plugs Sherriff and Jordan Jeans.

Strong start

The Winterhawks laid the ground work for another blowout victory through the opening half, but squandered a 3-0 lead and had to rely on a late surge and solid goaltending to finally prevail.

Overall, Arnold made two dozen saves — and was particularly sharp when challenged downstairs — en route to his third win of the season.

Chad Merritt and Corey Leigh provided solid defensive assistance throughout the evening clash — which was somewhat marred down the stretch by a few minor skirmishes and a whistle-happy referee.

Despite a couple of mental breakdowns, the hosts were the more impressive of the two teams — winning the majority of the one-on-one battles and showing stronger on puck possession as well as faceoffs.

Superb starts have been key to the local juveniles' recent success.

Over the last three games they've outscored the competition 8-1 in the opening frame. Saturday they outshot Penetag 13-2 in the first period and by the end of it were ahead 2-0.

The last time I was on a football field as a non-reporter was about 10 years ago at Rich Stadium after a game in which the Buffalo Bills had clinched a playoff spot.

I think we might have started the tailgate party a little early that day because some of my friends literally fell onto the field, along with thousands of others. I, of course, just followed along to make sure I didn't lose my ride.

I remember a number of things about that day. The first was that it was so cold, I can still feel it.

The second was one of my buddies trying to climb up this icy hill so we could get to the parking lot.

Each time he made it almost to the top I'd reach out and offer him a hand, and each time I'd push him back down the hill, and laugh my fool head off.

There's actually no point to that particular story except that it still makes me laugh.

The most thrilling thing to me, though, was actually being on an NFL field. We had an impromptu game of football using a frozen glove as the football and I scored

three touchdowns in five minutes. I was amazing, I tell you, even if I was the only one who could walk in a straight line, and every play started from the five-yard line.

Of course, I pretended I was scoring those touchdowns in an NFL game on Monday Night Football. Quite a thrill, too, thank you very much. Hi Mom!

The thing is I can only imagine what it's like to score a touchdown for real. I believe that out of all the different types of scoring in sports that a touchdown is the most special.

Part of that reason is that football is so much different than other sports. Most sports are games, which is the way it should be, but football is more like a war. The complexities of preparing for that one battle per week are far greater than any another sport can even approach.

And the level of physical punishment to themselves and their opponents is off the

That's not to say that football players are more athletically talented than those who play other sports because that's like comparing baseballs and hockey pucks. And that's not to say that other sports don't subject themselves to a great deal of discipline, physical hardships, and mental fatigue.

Football is different, and so are its players. There's the quarterback, for one thing, who plays the coolest position in any sport and is the one most responsible for his team's success or failure, or at least is perceived to be.

Quarterbacks tend to be cool guys who have an air of cockiness about them. You could argue that most every boy in Canada and the United States grew up fantasizing about being the quarterback on his high school football team.

Then there's the running back, which tends to be a determined individual who will stop at nothing to get to his goal. The other offensive glamour position is the receiver, who is somewhere between the quarterback and running back in attitude, often with a little flakiness thrown in for some reason.

In hockey, getting a goal isn't uncommon; in basketball, points are scored frequently; and scoring a single run in baseball isn't too difficult a task.

Soccer goals aren't common, but in all four of those sports the play goes back and forth and almost any member of the teams can score.

In football, teams get on the battlefield and literally have to march up the field in order to get their score. They're fighting for territory, one yard at a time. Everybody on the field has a stake in making sure that march doesn't falter so they can reach their goal.

When a touchdown is finally scored, it's a payoff for all the physical indignities each member of the team has had to endure, all the planning, all the pain and suffering.

They've won the battle within the war. It's the triumph of good over evil.

Whether it's a running back or receiver or quarterback who scores and gets the actual glory, in reality they're just the flag bearer for the rest of the team.

Mind you, they also get bragging rights.
Recently, on the same day, Greg van Es of

Bishop Reding each scored three touchdowns.

I can Al Bundy with the worst of them. I once scored six goals in a hockey game, hit a ball over the fence for a home run, slamdunked a basketball (off a trampoline) and even managed to score a goal in practice one time when I played on a kid's soccer team (one kid scored every single goal during games).

And once, I threw a perfect spiral through a tire in a national media promotion event to give my team the win and the money for the charities of our choice.

But, I never scored a touchdown.
