

After Brampton stormed ahead on backto-back tallies from Jeff Hristovsky, Alterg cut the lead in half by jamming one in low and evened the count just before first intermission by depositing his own doorstep leftovers.

Then Remenda took over to finish the comeback. Continuing to exhibit shades of the now departed Ryan Eby, Milton's high flyer barreled his way to the net and delivered the game winner midway through the night by tipping in a centering pass from Andy Rozak.

From there he provided the insurance marker with four minutes left in regulation, making a nifty little move inside and sinking one through the pads of Scott McKeown — who was filling in for star cager Danny Gould, one of eight players suspended from the night before.

The Merchants benefited from the return of Dan DeLong and Mike McGrane as well as the robust play of Vince Laise, who's been showing strongly since being a healthy scratch three games ago.

Joel Cameron was between the pipes for the win, his 11th this year.

They scored twice during the lengthy stint with the extra attacker but also surrendered a shorthanded goal which essentially proved to be the difference as the Brampton won 6-4. An empty netter in the final minute sealed Milton's fate.

The Merchants' goals came from Alterg, Laise, Kevin Arruda and newcomer Jason Harshaw, who also picked up an assist for his third multi-point performance since becoming a Merchant.

Merchant notes: Defenceman Chris Krieg, formerly of the Hamilton Kilty Bees, saw his first action as a Merchant during the two-game series with Brampton and showed strongly on the blueline ... Milton hosts Mississauga Friday and closes out the week in Buffalo Saturday.
