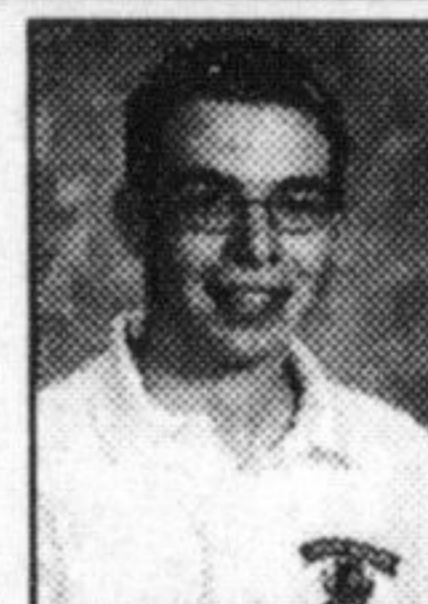

This coming Wednesday, B.R. is starting its annual Christmas season food drive. Please help support the less fortunate by sending in non-perishables.

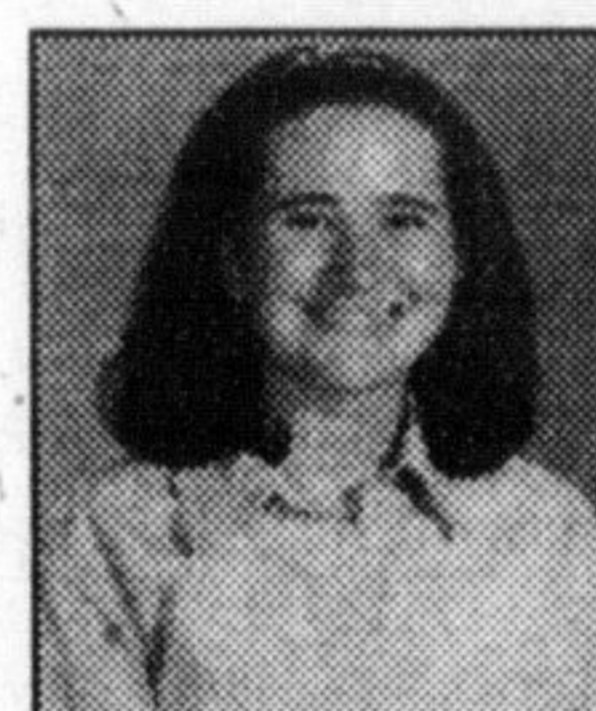
Students who are planning to attend college next year but are not yet on the application list, please go to Student Services to add your name to the list.
