



Merchants blueliner named Taylor Nursery to Under-17 Ontario squad

Merchant fans have quickly come to know Rick Janco as a hard-working young defenceman with leadership skills and character beyond his years.

And pretty soon the rest of the country will learn that as well — or at least those who follow the upcoming Under-17 World Hockey Challenge.


The 16-year-old blueliner is among seven former GTHLers, and one of three ex-Toronto Marlboros (including one-time Merchant hopeful Rick Nash), who've been named to Team Ontario for the holiday tournament.

"It feels great. Actually I was getting a little nervous because it was coming pretty close to the deadline (for choosing the team)," said the 6'1", 210 lbs. rearguard, who got the call about making the squad last Wednesday.

Janco — who saw an awful lot of ice time and showed strongly during the Merchants' blueline injury rash early this season — feels competing in the Under-17 World Hockey Challenge will be a major confidence booster.

Not that he hasn't already enjoyed a healthy dose of that since becoming a Merchant.

"The guys in this league are faster and bigger, so you've got to learn to move the puck quicker and be

ready to play with more toughness," he said.

The Merchants' youngest defenceman certainly has no shortage of the latter — but it's his less tangible qualities that have most impressed head coach Glenn Walsh.

"Rick's heard a hundred times over that he has tremendous character, that's one of his defining attributes. He's willing to do

whatever it takes to succeed," remarked Milton's bench boss. "Sometimes it's easy to forget that he's a 16-year-

old. He'll probably, almost certainly, be a star in this league in the coming years."

Added captain and defensive anchor John Nadalin, "He's given us a lot of depth on the blueline for such a young guy. He's got great composure and has fit right in here."

Janco is the second Merchant defenceman in four seasons to play for the Under-17 squad. Matt Bannan did so in 1997/98, and helped Ontario beat the Czech Republic 3-2 for the gold.

This year's tournament will be held December 27 to January 4 in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia.
