
He's back.

Former Milton Merchant Adam Sturgeon's return had been rumoured for months, and finally came to fruition at the trade deadline Wednesday.

Complete with longer locks and more muscle, the 16-year-old defenceman is

back competing after nearly a full season off due to some undisclosed problems with Sudbury Wolves.

"It's great to be back in uniform," said the young rearguard, who up until last week was keeping in shape through father Peter's Pro Bound program. "However, I was expecting to step in and have a bit better return."

Nevertheless, Sturgeon's second coming has some promising implications for a blueline unit that's quite steady overall, but a little light in two areas — it's ability to rush the puck and clear the front of the net.

In regards to the former, the returning defenceman's skills have never been in question.

But now at an fairly imposing 6'2" and 185 pounds., Sturgeon may be ready to exhibit as much prowess within close quarters as he has in open-ice situations.

"I'd like to think I can add some toughness to the team," he said.

Merchant GM Nick Slawson believes so too, and feels that the baby-face blueliner is set to assume a much bigger workload than he did over the previous two seasons.


"I envision him being one of our goto defenceman and helping take some of the load off John (Nadalin). He just needs a few games to get his timing and stamina back up."


Cougar sniper picked up
