





It's Almost Restoration of Mill Pond MARCH BREAKS project almost completed

The Mill Pond is in the final stages of redevelopment and should be completed within two weeks, said Jennifer Reynolds, director of community services for the Town of Milton.

"The pond will be re-filled within a few weeks, "she

"It's been an extensive project with the wetland and shoreline rehabilitation. When the pond is re-filled, it will be a more natural habitat for both plants and fish. We also put in a gazebo."

The pond was drained in the winter of 2000 and excavated this past fall.

The problems began when an overgrowth of milfoil invaded the pond in the past few years, Ms Reynolds said.

The milfoil choked out native plant species such as bulrushes and lily pads in the pond.

That in turn contributed to a decrease in the fish, amphibian and reptile populations.

An attempt to rid the pond of milfoil last summer didn't go far enough, resulting in an almost immediate regrowth of the plant.

In order to get at the root of the problem, the Mill Pond sub-committee, comprised of representatives of the Ministry of Environment and Energy, Ministry of Natural Resources and Town and Halton Conservation staff suggested temporarily draining the pond.

The cost of the re-development of the pond was \$650,000.


