

Major restoration planned for Waldie's Blacksmith Shop

here once stood an attractive barn-like structure, where local residents brought in their horses for new shoes, now stands a dilapidated shack.

Waldie's Blacksmith Shop closed its doors in 1969 after serving Milton for more than 100 years.

But thanks to a \$75,000 grant from the Trillium Foundation of Ontario, Waldie's Blacksmith Shop may once again serve the community.

"It's going to be a historical site," said Mandy Sedgwick, a member of the Milton Historical Society and chair of the restoration committee.

"We want to restore it as a useful blacksmith shop for schools to visit. Community groups can use the back part of the shop for meetings. There is so much history here; the shop went through four generations of the Waldie family."

In addition to the grant received, the Milton Historical Society forked over \$15,000 and is aiming to raise \$225,000 for the complete restoration of the shop, she said.

Complete restoration is expected to take between one and three years.

"The repairs needed are so major," Ms Sedgwick said. "Eight windows need to be redone, along with the walls and the foundation. We need concrete for the foundation. We're planning to have a series of fundraising programs for this spring."

Marsha Waldie, owner of the shop and great-grand daughter of the original founder, James Alfred Waldie, said she and her sister wanted to restore the shop for some time.

"We could never get anyone to take the lead on it," she said. "I wanted to do this to be able to educate people of the chronological evolution of the shop and increase the profile of the historical society."

Tom Murison, a historical technician who was hired to research the shop, said he believes it to be the oldest structure in Milton.

"The shop was opened in 1867," he said.


"Some of the nails in the planks of wood are from 1821. An original safety horse stock was also kept. The horses belly would be strapped and the hoof would fit into the stirrups and the horse would get new shoes."

Ms Sedgwick said a lot of the tools kept over the years would normally be found in a museum setting.

"It's important to preserve Milton's heritage," she said.


