Early scoring surge leads to lopsided win

The Merchants answered the call of opportunity and waiting on the line was their biggest playoff win to date.

Taking full advantage of a concentrated rash of penalties by the host Couchiching Terriers Tuesday, Milton scored four times on two-man powerplays near the end of the first period and went on to thrash their northern opponents 7-2.

"What can you say, we capitalized on every opportunity they gave us," said general manager Nick Slawson.

The lopsided victory — which put the local juniors ahead twogames-to-one in the league semifinals series, which so far as been a visitors' series — was number three in a row on hostile ground for the Merchants.

It also strengthened the notion that they can play with their heads as well as their hearts.

Unlike the aggressive Brampton Capitals, Couchiching employs a wideopen style and can make teams pay for a lack of structure or discipline.

But Milton afforded their hosts little of either during game three - making the necessary adjustments to succeed against an offensively potent but physically inept club.

"Our fore checking and back checking really stifled any offense they could muster. We're playing very well on the big ice surface," remarked Slawson.

Added playoff scoring sensation Andy Rozak, "I think we're adapting pretty well. Couchiching's a very skilled team, but we're definitely skating with them."


