Willson is 30-years-old, which for fencing is young. "The older you get, the better you get. You peak at an older age," he explained.

"They call fencing, physical chess. Now that I'm older, I spend more time looking for my opponent's weaknesses and trying to capitalize on it."

He admits when he was younger, he was more reck-

lessly aggressive which tends not to work in this sport.

remembers one opponent who was about 70-yearsold, who "cleaned my clock" when he was first starting

Willson fences out of an Oakville club, but also works out Georgetown under coach Emil Dimitrov — who is involved in training swimmers as well as



Already this year, he's achieved one of his goals, finishing in the top two in the Ontario Circuit Challenge finals, and his next goal is to try and get into the top 30 nationally.

He is working on improving his speed and strategy, and adding more hits to his repertoire.

Willson has noticed a renewed interest in the sport, and sees a lot of kids starting to become more involved. He's hoping within the next year or so to open up a club in Milton along with Dimitrov.

The 'Hawks were then blanked by Woodstock 5-0 and outdistanced by Niagara-on-the-Lake 5-3.


McGovern capitalized on a penalty shot in the round-robin finale and helped set up a third-period marker by Matthew Dupont.
