Funds don't help region's affordable housing woes

Halton Region is receiving \$1.4 million for social housing, but it won't build a single new apartment or townhouse unit.

The money from the Province is to be spent on capital improvements and administration costs for public housing programs. In Halton, since 1998, municipal taxes have provided subsidies amounting to \$34 million annually, an obligation no longer shared by the Province.

Gwen Maloney, director of Halton's Non-profit Housing Corporation division, said the funds, while welcome, don't tackle the shortage of affordable housing.

"It's really got nothing to do with what it costs to build, it's just that we've got to put administrative systems in place."

A desperate shortage of affordable housing in Burlington and the rest of the region continues to exist, she said.

"There's no money there for new construction — what we'd really like is for the federal and provincial governments to get back into the housing business."

Between the Halton Non-Profit Housing Corporation and Halton Housing Authority there are cur-

rently 1,820 housing units, apartments and townhouses providing shelter for disabled residents, seniors, families on social assistance and the working poor.

Rents in most of those units are subsidized by municipal taxpayers so they don't exceed 30 per cent of a household income. On top of these subsidized units, there are also about 2,200 lower-cost housing units available between privately-owned co-ops and non-profit projects.

But it still doesn't come close to meeting the need in Halton, where there are 1,800 names on a waiting list to get into Halton's subsidized housing and where some families can expect to wait up to seven years.

Untold numbers currently leave Halton and end up in either Hamilton or Toronto in order to


find affordable housing, she said. Others stay with families and friends or "fall into worse and worse situations."

The provincial government recently downloaded the responsibility for planning and delivery of social housing services. On top of that, responsibility for most federally-funded social housing was transferred to the Province under a federal/provincial social housing agreement in November, 1999. According to a provincial government news release, \$29.5 million will be provided across Ontario for entitlements of the employees who were transferred from provincial to the municipal level.

About \$6 million will be given for what the Province describes as start-up costs, \$9 million for efficiencies in administration, technolstaff training, business realignment and other costs.

The Province will also be distributing a further \$58 million in federal funding related to the federal housing program. These funds can be used for building, reviews, capital repairs and other social housing purposes.

The Province will also provide municipalities with an additional \$8 million for a new computerized property management system that will help them manage social housing more efficiently.


