As reported elsewhere in this newspaper, 10 local students in the public school system and four in the Catholic system are being honoured for excellence as part of Education Week.


The awards are not just given for academics, but also athletics, community work, citizenship, family commitment and leadership skills.

The Mill Pond was a regular allseason outdoor 'recreation centre' for Milton youth at that time.

As long as I can remember, it was just simply called the Mill Pond, The much respected Martin fam- and I wanted to keep that little part believe 'Mill Pond Millennium Gazebo' reflects that.

I also think millennium should be part of the name, as that was the reason for the gazebo being built, and I agree, after all the hullabaloo that led up to the millennium(s) -2000? 2001?— most of us have grown weary of the name overuse.
