The masked men quickly approached her car, opened the driver's door and uttered racial slurs before punching her in the face several times.

Once the assailants fled the scene the woman was able to flag down a motorist for assistance and escape the incident with minor injuries.

Miltonians, themselves, are the worst speeders in the area, police say

Miltonians among the worst offenders when it comes to dangerous driving on rural roads.

That's the finding of Halton Regional Police's Project Gateway --- an initiative geared at nabbing speeders and aggressive drivers.

The program was initially expected to run until the end of April, but has been extended to help police assess where the problem areas are.

And what's being discovered is that local aren't just motorists

breaking speed limits, they're doing so at alarm-

ing rates.
"Our officers are routinely encountering motorists exceeding the speed limits by 30 or 40 km an hour. This is simply not acceptable for our community," Inspector Bill Ford.

Bulk of offenders come from Milton

While commuters from Guelph, Rockwood, Erin and Flamborough are among regular speedlimit violators, the bulk of offenders come from town, according to Det. Sgt. Jackie Gordon.

"They make up more than half of the offenses and sometimes are going double the speed limit," she said.

Police are utilizing a spectrum of enforcement tools in their drive to make north Halton safer for everyone. Moving and stationary radar is being employed, as are unmarked cruisers and laser radar.

Said Insp. Ford, "Our resolve is to develop Halton's reputation to be the safest community in Canada on the roadways as well as in our communities. Our community deserves no less."


