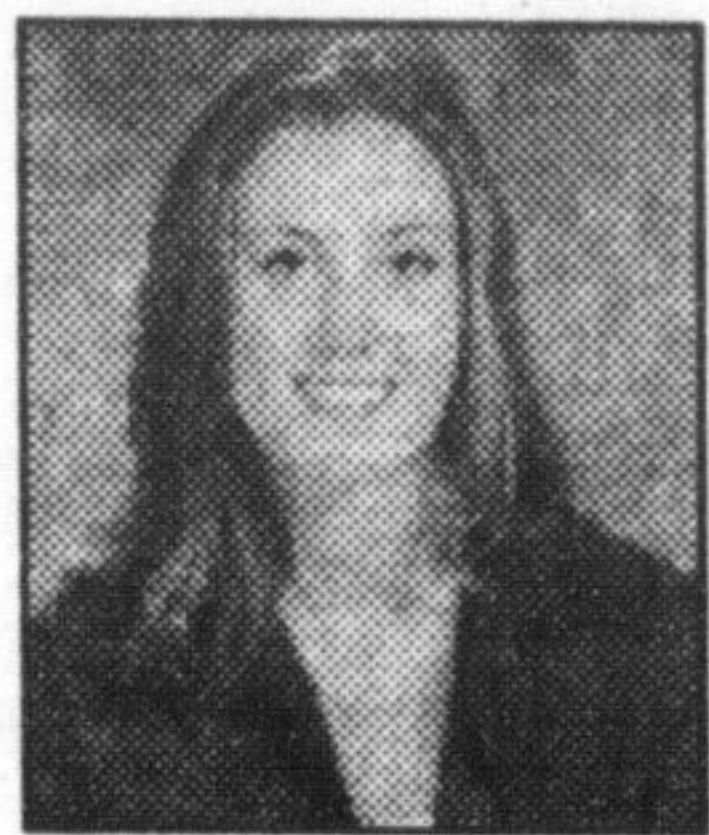
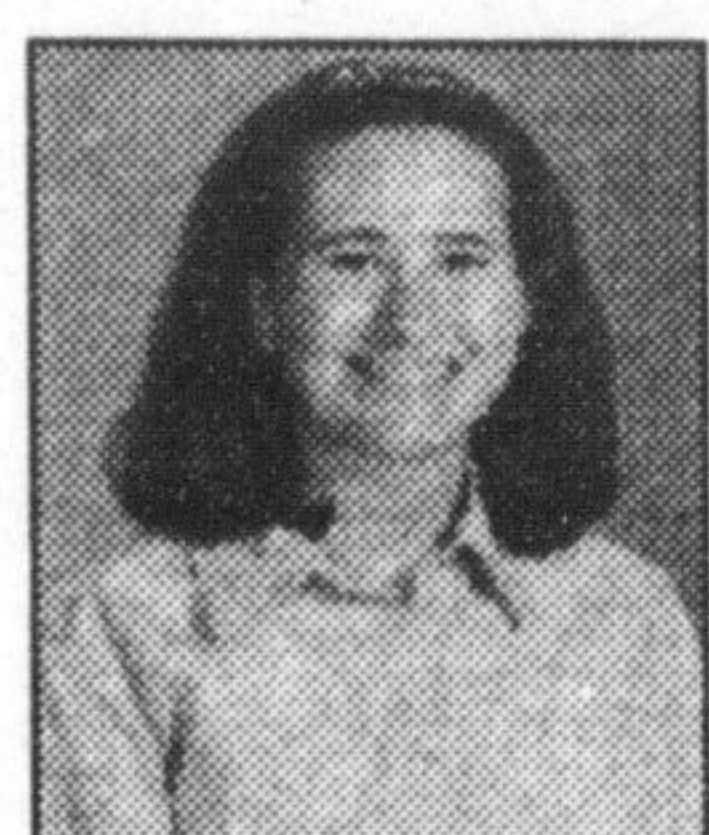


HIGH SCHOOL REPORT
