Milton's junior baseball team decided not to tempt fate again.

The last time the Red Sox held a sizable lead against Mississauga North they got a little overconfident, lost their focus and wound up losing in extra innings.

It marked the first win this season against Mississauga North and the second victory of the week for the Red Sox — who're now 6-4 in regular season play.

Efforts in the latter department came during the fifth when he lashed out a two-run single to put the local lads over the top.

opening frame - including a two-run, sixthinning dinger that offered the Bengals a ray of hope for a comeback victory.

Jeff MacLeod made five put-outs in centre field — including one of the diving variety to punctuate the win — while scoring twice was Paul Faggion. The victory came without five regulars including reliable sluggers Nate Perrott and Jordan Jeans.

Two nights earlier in Campbellville, Milton continued its dominance over newly established Halton Country — hammering its rural rivals 13-2 in the first of two make-ups last week.

Perrott went the distance on the mound while three-hit efforts came from Lawton, MacLeod and Reese Davies.

Jarrett Konkle and Andrew Neilson had two doubles apiece.




