

Scholtz family feels blessed as Deidre still in good health

live years after returning home from a bone marrow transplant, Milton's Deidre Scholtz looks and acts like a typical 11-yearold.

When no family members were a suitable match, the Scholtzes turned to the public, organizing one of the largest bone marrow donor clinics in North America. Between 2,000 and 3,000 people attended to see if they would be a suitable

But Deidre's donor was found far from the Milton area in British Columbia. Though the family knows who the donor is, father Clem Scholtz said she wishes to remain anonymous to the general public.

Although reluctant to discuss

the donor out of respect for her Deidre was diagnosed with privacy, the thankful parents said talked with her several times on the telephone.

> Ms Scholtz recalled their first conversation with the donor. "Here's this poor woman painting her bathroom and you've got two people, two emotional fools on the other end of the phone. I was as speechless that night as I am now."

Youth drop-in centre in search of new site after building is sold

After five years of calling Mill Street home, the Xcape Youth Drop-In Centre will have to pack its bags by the end of August.

"We were told the building was to be sold," said Jim DeMarsh, a Milton Bible Church pastor and centre volunteer worker. "Right now the centre is open Friday nights until the end of August."

The centre received notice of the closing at the end of June.

"We're in the process of completing an assessment and evaluation right now," Pastor DeMarsh said, adding the centre has yet to find a new home.

Thousands of teenagers have come through the centre over the years, he said.

"Two years ago we started an alternative school program (STEP) in the centre. We've held community dinners for youth and fitness programs. On Friday nights the kids can play pool and indoor games such as hockey and basketball."

The Xcape Youth Drop-In Centre opened as a place for "at- risk" youth to interact


