

Lynch finally makes return from surgery

After sitting out more than year and agonizing through lengthy shoulder rehabilitation Miltonian Pat Lynch finally got back in the game.

The 22-year-old hurler pitched a perfect inning of relief for the Tri-City Dust Devils in the Northwest League, as part of his rehabilitation for the Colorado Rockies.

A couple days later he was back in action again, although not quite as successful. He surrendered a home run, but struck out three batters over two innings of work.

The former Milton District High School ace — who helped guide the Mustangs to a Bob Prentice Cup championship in 1996 — missed all of last year following spring shoulder surgery.

Nagging pains delayed his return this season.

Lynch is expected to be brought around slowly after his injury.

Meanwhile, Milton's other pro ball player, Shayne Ridley, recently moved from the Baltimore chain to Kansas City.

After being released by the Orioles from the Delmarva Shorebirds, he had a couple of options, and chose the Royals organization.

He's currently with the Burlington Bees in the Class A Midwest League. Burlington is in Iowa.
