# Mystics deliver consolation title win at own tournament

It wasn't exactly the Magical Mystery Tour, but the Milton Mystics girls midget fastball team did find a roundabout way of winning the consolation championship at their own tournament last weekend.

They opened against the Hamilton Tigers. The Tigers jumped out to a first-inning 2-0 lead, but pitcher Katie MacKroory kept them off the score sheet for the next five innings.

The Mystics got one run back in the second when Ameer May led off with a double and was brought home by Alicia Taylor. Ashley Elliot followed that up with another double, but Taylor was thrown out at home and the rally was stalled.

Milton tied it up in the fourth inning, after Sarah Zebruck led off with a walk, and was sacrificed to second by MacKroory.

Tara Elkie followed with a single, and then on a nice bunt by Laura Ann Sheehan the return throw from first was too late to catch Zebruck sliding into home.

### Offense dries up

That was all the offense they could muster, although in the fifth inning, with two base runners aboard, Carolyn Coates blistered a line drive that appeared headed for extra bases.

The third baseman made a great catch, however, and doubled a runner off at first.

A couple of outstanding defensive plays kept the score tied through the sixth inning. One was a snag by Elkie to get to a ball going up the middle, finished off by Sarah Mooney making a big stretch at first base to get the third out. The other key play was on a ball hit to center fielder May.

She made a throw all the way to Tasha Leslie at third base to get an out before the runner could cross the plate. Hamilton scored three runs in the seventh inning to win 5-2.

The Mystics played well in their remaining two round robin games but lost them both by close counts. In a 4-2 loss to Stoney Creek, Lindsey Harrold managed to keep the opponents off the score sheet for much of the game, and was helped by a home run by May.

In a 3-1 defeat to Aurora, Zebruck drove in Lindsey McLaughlin for their lone run.

Milton faced Ancaster in their first playoff game. Ancaster had gone undefeated in their division, so they got to face Milton, which had gone winless, finishing last in their side of the draw.

### Quick start make the difference

The Mystics didn't waste any time getting out of the box, when Elkie tripled to open the game. Sheehan drove her in with a single, and then scored herself when May tripled.

Sheehan and MacKroory, who also got the win in the 4-1 decision, scored in the third. Ancaster's lone tally came on a home run.

The Mystics never got on track against the Mississauga North Tigers in an 8-1 loss that sent Milton to the consolation finals. A triple by McLaughlin, followed by a Shannon MacKenzie sacrifice fly accounted for their only run.

In the consolation final, Milton jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the first inning against Chatham. After Elkie walked and Sheehan singled, a throw by the catcher to second base went into center field, allowing both runners to score.

In the fourth, Milton loaded the bases with none out, with Taylor working a walk to score Elkie.

In the sixth inning, McLaughlin and Kate Moore opened with hits, with MacKroory scoring McLaughlin on a single.

The Mystics went on to win the consolation final by a score of 4-2.
