

Bantam girls earn revenge in back-to-back league victories

Payback was in ample supply for the bantam baseball girls last week in regular season play.

Milton exacted a measure of revenge against both Burlington and Mississauga — who defeated the local squad in key tournament showdowns earlier this summer — on consecutive evenings to pull within a game of first place.

Victory number one came against top-seated Burlington August 1. Laura Wellstead held the league front-runners scoreless through the last two innings to give the local ladies an 11-8 triumph — which knotted the regional rivals' season series at two wins apiece.

Alana Petrie's two-out single in the third inning

cashied in a pair of runs to put Milton ahead to stay while chipping in with a couple of hits each were Haley MacDonald and Katie Wollaston.

The next night at home, the bantams hammered Mississauga 12-5 — thanks in large part to five-run outbursts in the third and sixth innings.

Erin Baker and Jan Wollaston led the hit parade with three singles each, while also standing out with a bases-clearing double was Richelle Hannah.

Ali Stoffels pitched the first three innings and did not allow a run over that stretch. Closing things out on the mound in credible fashion was Wellstead.

Milton was rock solid defensively during both contests.

Fine finish for Red Sox

Milton's midget boys baseball team punctuated a sensational regular season with a huge exclamation mark.

Continuing an impressive drive toward the provincial championships in Brantford, Jeff Harper's charges secured one-run victories against a pair of 'AA' clubs in successive outings.

At Maplehurst Sunday, Milton battled back from a late deficit to shade Mississauga North 5-4. Chris Dumencu was the difference maker at the plate — scoring on a Steve Spiers hit just moments after cashing in both Rob Angus and Evan Jeans on a seventh-inning double to deep left field.

Kevin Cooper also shone offensively with four hits while overall the hosts out-hit Mississauga North 13-10.

In addition to his game-winning RBI, Spiers offered effective relief pitching — surrendering just one run over the final four-and-two-third innings — and initiated a key double play from centre field in the

second to quash a potential rally by the visitors.

The Red Sox switched gears two nights later on the road — grabbing an early lead en route to toppling Brampton 4-3.

Reliever Michael Volpe gave up all three runs in the sixth before settling down and retiring 11 straight batters to earn the save. Starter Kevin Cooper tossed five shutout innings. Both pitchers enjoyed sharp defense — an aspect of the midgets' game that had taken temporary hiatus the previous week.

Once again it was Dumencu scoring the winning run. This time a hard grounder to second base in the fourth frame by Conan O'Brien — who'd already driven in a pair of two innings earlier — brought him home. Dumencu scored the second run as well while also crossing the plate were Scott Connolly and Andrew Pepper.

Milton finished with just a handful of losses in two dozen regular season contests and overall were 25-8-1.
