Hospital obstetrics closing, again

As of October 1, babies won't be delivered at Milton District Hospital (MDH) until next summer.

Dr. Sandy Sharma, the sole obstetrician at the hospital for the past two years, announced yesterday he's unable to continue providing obstetrical care at the Milton site due to personal reasons.

He said that an insurmountable workload and excessive demands have taken a heavy toll on him personally.

"To maintain this pace, I would be heading for physician burnout," Dr. Sharma said in a press release.

care at MDH, his current obstetrical patients will deliver at Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital

(OTMH), where he's part of the obstetrical on-call roster for the Maternal Child Program.

"We value Dr. Sharma's contribution over the past two years and recognize the demands of providing sole obstetrical coverage are not sustainable indefinitely," said Dr. Marion King, associate chief of staff at MDH.

"We will do everything possible to support him in providing quality obstetrical service to the community."

The arrival of a new obstetrician is scheduled for the summer of 2002 and on-site services are expected to be reinstated.

Taking effect October 1, Dr. Sharma's office will remain open at the MDH site and he will still pro-Although he will continue to provide prenatal vide gynecological procedures, however some emergency services may be referred to the OTMH site after hours. Regular gynecological surgery

will continue at the MDH site.

"The hospital remains committed to ensuring continued access to quality obstetrical care," said John Oliver, president and CEO of Halton Health Care Services. "While we regret the disruption to the present obstetrical service at this time, we are looking forward to a return to full-service in the summer of 2002."

Maternity ward nurses at MDH will be reassigned to different units at both MDH and OTMH, said Cindy McDonell, chief operating officer at MDH.

"I want to make clear Dr. Sharma is still Milton's obstetrician, he'll just be delivering (babies) in Oakville," she said.

The maternity ward previously shut down temporarily in 1997 after obstetrician Dr. Sushil Suppal left the hospital.
