
Former Milton resident and police officer Ian McNally leaves behind a legacy of compassion and humour following his death this week, say friends.

"We were saddened to hear of it. He was still young," said Halton Regional Police Chief Ean Algar, who worked with Mr. McNally during his 26-year career with the force.

"When you worked with the chap, you always had a sense that he cared about the community. He always treated people fairly and it didn't matter whether you were the perpetrator or the victim. He was very concerned about people."

Mr. McNally, 60, died Monday after suffering an apparent heart attack while travelling in the United States. He's survived by wife Nancy, sons Neil and Mike, daughter Annette Rankin, and two grandchildren.

"He was just a great guy, a lot of fun," reminisced Roy Smith, a friend and former co-worker. "He was very witty. He could deliver a great comeback with lightning speed. If you were on the brunt end of his joke, he could get you quick. Of course, it was always just a fun little jab."



lan McNally became a bylaw enforcement officer late in his career.

Mr. McNally retired from Halton Regional Police in 1994, accepting the position of bylaw enforcement officer with the Town of Milton. Five years later, he retired from that position and moved to Campbellford, near Peterborough, with his

Town council honoured Mr. McNally's passing with a moment of silence at the opening of Monday's council meeting.

The funeral will be held today at Holy Rosary Church on Martin Street at 10 a.m. Internment follows at Evergreen Cemetery.

OWNERS AND OPERATORS OF COMMUNAL DRINKING WATER SYSTEMS

The Ministry of the Environment is holding meetings for selected owners and operators of drinking water systems that must comply with the requirements of the Drinking Water Protection Regulation (O. Reg. 459/00). You are invited if you are a private owner or operator of a communal water system that:

- supplies drinking water to six or more residences; or
- supplies 50,000 or more litres of drinking water to the public on any day, and has the capacity to supply 250,000 or more litres per day.

Note that these meetings do not apply to municipally-owned or operated water systems.

The ministry wishes to hear from communal systems about testing procedures, disinfection methods, reporting and other O. Reg. 459/00 requirements.
