

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## Suspect arrested in devastating murder of 'quiet, kind' man



Those who knew Murray Dean Parrott would say he wasn't your typical man.

He was more than a father, son, husband and friend.

He was a quiet, friendly gentleman who went out of his encourage, support and love.

And he was a creative man. For the



- word of mouth was all he needed. The body of Mr. Parrott, 53, was found behind the curling club on a dirt walking path near Millside Drive early last Friday morning.

An autopsy concluded he died from knife wounds to the neck and chest. There was also blunt force to his head and body.

Douglas Stokes, 19, of Mississauga, who had been working as a roofer in Milton, was arrested Sunday at a relative's home in St. Catharines and was charged with firstdegree murder. He was remanded in custody in Ontario Court (provincial division) in Milton yesterday and will return to court to set a trial date October 4.

"The hardest part for me and for his friends is that Murray would be the last one to pick a fight with someone," a teary Pat Parrott, his wife of 23 years, told The Champion Tuesday.

"I've known Murray 25 years and I've heard his voice raise twice. Vicious things were done to him. This is the worse misjustice I could ever fathom."

Ms Parrott said if her husband had met someone "with such rage in their soul" he would have talked to them and tried to



