Sr. Sox win Ontario 'D' title

The past few years have been — to say the least rather dismal for the senior Red Sox.

But Sunday's Ontario 'D' championship win made up for much of that.

Punctuating a much-improved season — and strengthening the hope for a new area of competitive baseball — the short-staffed locals staved off elimination five straight times to claim gold at the doubleknockout provincial showcase in Hanover.

The Bob's Auto Service/HJM Insurance Brokers sponsored seniors played with their backs to the wall all weekend after falling in round one, and were finally crowned champs after back-to-back decisions over Thorold Sunday.

Milton last captured provincial gold in 1992. In addition to mainstay manager Glenn Turner, Matt McCandless and George Moore were part of that team — and both figured in the title-clinching victory this time around.

Moore saw some late relief pitching duty and got the final out while McCandless made up for a costly error just moments earlier by clobbering a two-out, seventhinning solo homer to tie the game 5-5 and send it to extra innings.

Dramatic conclusion

The stage was then set for some ninth-inning heroics - which Kevin Wilson was only too happy to offer. With speedy Dwayne Johnson at second base, the veteran slugger — part of Milton District High School's 1996 Bob Prentice Cup championship squad — lashed out a single to drive in the winning run and put the finishing touches on a thoroughly memorable weekend.

Craig Holloway also stood out in the tournament finale with a homer — one of three he'd record on the weekend. He finished up with an amazing 10 RBI plus a second-round victory over Chesley.

"Young and old helped put this thing together," said first-year coach Moore. "It was a real roller-coaster weekend with a lot of highs and lows."

Fortunately the latter were kept to a minimum by the Red Sox — who along with missing a few key players also had to contend with a pint-size park in nearby Chelsey that made long balls a hot commodity, partic-

ularly in their initial engagement with Thorold.

Milton went downtown only half as often as their opponents — three times compared to six — but got them all in succession as Wilson, Jeff Sommer and Phil Grieg delivered a concentrated homer-fest.

Meanwhile, Adam Finkbeiner provided a lengthy and highly credible relief pitching stint and his teammates offered a lot of support at the plate to help outdistance Thorold 12-11.

Earlier in the day it was the seniors defensive prowess that equaled victory over Clarksburg. Finkbeiner was in cruise control on the mound and despite the absence of shortstop Brian Rothery enjoyed near flawless fielding to win 3-0. Catcher Ryan Davison gunned down three runners at second to lead the defensive charge. Grieg and Sommer each had multi-hit efforts in the narrow victory.

While Milton's provincial success was mainly their own doing, a little third-round fortune played a role as

Up 6-5 after two innings against Cortwright Saturday afternoon, the eventual champs were awarded the victory when the opposing catcher was ejected for unsportsmanlike conduct and his teammates responded by forfeiting the game — despite having a handful of substitutes.

Before that, Holloway enjoyed a career game against Chelsey that ended in a 15-2 mercied win. He went the distance on the hill and allowed a measely three hits while offensively he drove in six runs on three hits, including a grand slam.

Versus Owen Sound Friday, Milton was handcuffed at the plate and shaded 5-3. Former Red Sox Bill Corradetti — part of the team's last provincial championship squad — delivered the game-winning hit while Sommer belted a three-run shot to highlight his team's meager offensive performance.

Newcomer Brent Kostal provided impressive mound work in the first and final rounds of play last weekend. He went five innings without an earned run against Thorold.

Milton made progress in league play as well this year, upping their win total from three to seven and losing eight times by just a single run.

Juniors' defense finalized

The Merchants may have scored early and often last weekend, but they also made a strong case for the defense.

Make that stronger, with late pre-season moves that should shore up the defending Western Conference champions' blueline unit. 
and is now one of seven rearguards with his hometown club.
