• from THREE on page 4 furniture. I put the furniture in the garage."

In May, Ms Dickie phoned the shop and spoke with Oriena Currie, Mr. Currie's mother, and agreed to pick out other furniture from the shop instead of receiving a refund. She picked up a table, six chairs and a bookcase from the shop, but had to take the furniture to another location to be finished, which cost her an additional \$1,200.

Defense attorney Anthony Bryant pointed out no where on the order form did it say the balance was due upon delivery.

"We had a verbal agreement," Ms Dickie said.

He also pointed out Ms Dickie hadn't informed police she was holding furniture hostage and picked up several other pieces of furniture.

Ms Dickie said she left messages with police but never received a call back.

Renata Korzonek purchased a three-piece entertainment unit from the Village Pine Shoppe in June, 1999 and paid the full amount of \$1,600.

"He (Mr. Currie) said delivery would be in two weeks and wrote it down on the receipt. He charged my VISA for the full amount before we had discussed the down payment. I thought that wasn't right but I thought he was such a nice man. I signed (the receipt) and didn't say anything."

The day before the unit was to be delivered, Mr.

Currie phoned Ms Korzonek and said the unit couldn't be delivered on the promised date.

"I wasn't happy at all. I thought something was wrong from the beginning."

Several phone calls to the shop by Ms Korzonek weren't returned, she testified. She said she has yet to receive the entertainment unit or a refund.

Diane Marrows testified she visited the shop in August, 2000 with the intent of purchasing a bed.

She wrote out a cheque for the full amount of \$914 and was promised by Mr. Currie the bed would be delivered in a week. The delivery date went by and Ms Marrows was still without a bed.

"When I got hold of him (Mr. Currie) he said the bed still had to be stained. We weren't worried at this point because these things happen."

But after hearing time and time again from Mr. Currie the bed wasn't ready, Ms Marrows said she eventually demanded her money back.

"I asked him what kind of business he was running here. He said I would have to speak to his mother about the refund."

She said she left three messages for Ms Currie but never heard back from her.

Mr. Currie is charged with 17 counts of fraud under \$5,000 and one count of fraud over \$5,000.

The trial will continue in Ontario court (provincial division) in Oakville November 8.


