

## Liberty Balance keeps run going with win Friday

In spite of a rain-soaked track rated three seconds slower than normal, three-year-old trotting colt Liberty Balance made short work of a field of his Ontario-sired peers on Friday night.

Regular driver Randy Waples of Hornby sent the Breeder's Crown champion to the front from post seven and sailed around the Mohawk Racetrack oval unchallenged in 1:58.3.

The duo logged fractions of :29, :58.3 and 1:28.2 on the way to their eighth straight victory. Royal Pocket finished six-and-three-quarter lengths back in second and Bionic Ballad was another length behind for third.

Liberty Balance boosted his record to 11 wins and four seconds in 16 starts and \$852,818 in earnings for owners Tom and Elizabeth Rankin of St. Catharines.

With another \$50,000 available to the winner of next Saturday's Gold Final and \$250,000 up for grabs in the November 10 Super Final, Liberty Balance is poised to go over the \$1 million mark in earnings in his first year of racing.

He is also eligible for the Canadian Breeder's Championship—the last stake on his schedule before a well-earned winter vacation—and trainer Pat Hunt believes the gelding will be back on the racetrack next year.

"He'll race next year. I don't know where yet. It depends on how he finishes off this year and how much rest he gets," said the Cambridge resident. "There's a lot of money around for the aged horses too, but if he wants to race with the good boys we'll have to give him a good rest."

With Royal Glory scratched from Friday's elimination, all 10 starters advanced to this Friday's \$100,000 Gold Series Final. Top 10 point earners following that event will return to Mohawk November 10 for their \$250,000 Super Final — one of eight Super Finals that will be contested that evening.

## Familiar faces win Saturday

There were some familiar faces in the winner's circle at Flamboro Downs Saturday when the half-mile track played host to a pair of Ontario Sires Stakes Gold Series Elimination races for the three-year-old pacing colts.

In race two, Daylon Trooper captured top spot and \$27,758 with a 1:56 effort.

Coming out of post position one, the Camluck colt and driver Doug Brown got stuck behind traffic in the early going, sitting fifth for the first half of the mile. On the move through the final quarter, the Stew Firlotte trainee grabbed the lead at the top of the stretch and pulled away for the victory — returning \$5.40 to win, \$3.70 to place and \$2.10 to show.

Torlando Farms Inc, Clay Harland Horner and John Fielding of Toronto and Claude Incaudo of Marietta, New York own Daylon Trooper, who hit the wire one-and-three-quarter lengths ahead of Tyler. Taking third by a head was White Star Jo Jo.

The second Gold Elimination featured a repeat victory for Campbellville trainer Ben Wallace's Ton Of Diamonds. The son of Albert Albert eased his way out of post four into third spot and kept himself well positioned in mid-field until pulling into first at the half. Crossing the wire in a sharp 1:55.2 the colt — owned by Mississauga's Mottram Stable — paid out \$5.30, \$3.20 and \$2.90.

After having led through the early going, Camluck son N Xample slipped back into second at the midway mark and finished well behind Ton Of Diamonds. Rounding out the top three was Awesome Light.

The top four finishers from both eliminations will return to Flamboro Downs Saturday evening for their last Gold Series Final.
