Bid to fund citizens' groups taking legal action is shot down

A motion to fund citizens' groups aligning themselves with town planning issues fell flat when councillors debated the issue Monday.

"I don't believe taxpayer money should be used to support special interest groups," said Councillor Rick Malboeuf. "Taxpayer money belongs to all citizens, including those in opposition."

Those comments came on the heels of a proposal by Councillor John Challinor that would have seen a policy developed to provide up to \$25,000 in funding for citizens' groups complimenting the town's position in legal and quasi-judicial planning proceedings.

Mr. Challinor was the only member of council to vote in favour of the policy. Councillor Wally Hunter was absent from the meeting.




