Three people from his class of 100 were appointed to destroyers.

During his time on the Kootenay, Mr. Berry and his shipmates escorted convoys across the Atlantic Ocean and patrolled the English Channel watching for German submarines.

"It was a very exciting time for me because I had a big job, controlling the plot which kept track of where the submarine was. I would inform the captain on the bridge as to which contacts were real and where they were.

"One time, we knew we had a submarine, but in order to keep the continuity, I was up for three days and two nights — with one spell of having a brief rest. If someone new comes in, you sometimes lose everything. And it was very difficult maintaining contact with the submarine."

Near the end of the war, Mr. Berry was ordered to transfer to the aviation division of the navy, flying Fireflies. But he never lost his love for the sea, switching between the two divisions several times — rising through the ranks — before he finished his career as commander of the destroyer HMCS Algonquin in 1964.

"I became very fed up with what was happening (with the downsizing of the navy). We spend all these billions of dollars and air crew and stuff like that and it's all gone. Just like that," he said.

This isn't the first time the jewelry store has been vandalized. The front window has been broken twice.

"The first time was two years ago and then again in April," she said.

Ms Mangotich decided to speak out about the damage to her property to let other store owners and residents know what's happening in town.

"If we ignore the problem, people won't notice it. If we bring it out, they will notice it. All day people have been coming in saying they can't believe what happened to the planters. I want the public to be more aware as to what goes on, maybe form a neighbourhood watch."

Halton Hills Fine Jewelry wasn't the only store on Main Street to be vandalized Tuesday night. A plastic flower planter belonging to Tony's Barber Shop was also destroyed.

"We keep it outside and someone pulled it out to the middle of the sidewalk and broke it," said shop employee Charlie Graci. "It was filled with dirt. We've swept most of it up. We were just waiting for winter to come to bring it back into the store."

Mr. Graci said before this incident, his store hadn't encountered a problem with vandalism.

"It's unfortunate. They (Halton Hills Fine Jewelry) obviously got hit harder than us."

Det. Kim Duncan of 12 Division in Milton said vandalism in the downtown area isn't a common occurrence.

"It is a concern because Christmas is coming soon and the lights will be up. We send extra patrol in the downtown area for the Christmas season."

She said it's imperative if people see or hear something to call police.

"Community involvement is very important."

Mr. Berry worked at the Royal Canadian Air Force staff college in Toronto. It was there that he learned of the rich farm land that surrounded "Hog Town."

"I had always wanted to farm and I really didn't like Toronto, but there was all this farming history so close," he explained. "That's how I came to the area."


