



# Microwavable slippers a toasty The Ivy Arms creation by university student

Sometimes the best inventions come from the heart.

After trying to find a way to make life bearable for her mother, who suffers from a neuromuscular disorder that leaves her with freezing cold feet, Melissa Kotack invented a special kind of slipper — the microwavable type.

"I have a neuromuscular disease that leave me with freezing cold feet," explained Pat Kotack, Melissa's mother. "I couldn't find slippers that kept my feet warm and I just can't put on regular socks and slippers. So Melissa said she would design a pair of slippers that would help

The bootie style, polar fleece slippers are

made with whole oat grain - perfect for conducting and retaining heat, she said.

So for those who need a kick-start of warmth for their feet, these slippers will help, Ms Kotack said.

"Body heat and the grain feed off each other," she explained. "The heat will last a couple of hours before you would need to re-heat the slippers."

She said her slippers have been popular among people suffering from diabetes, arthritis, muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy and multiple sclerosis, or for people with chronically cold feet.

"It's been going well so far," she said. "I've sold about 800 to 900 pairs.

pair of socks with the slippers, in case the slippers are too warm for the bare foot.

For the past year, Ms Kotack, a university student, has been selling her therapeutic slippers at various craft shows at a cost of \$39.99. The slippers can also be ordered from her Web site, www.cosysoles.com, for \$49.99.

"It takes me about one hour to make a pair," she said, adding slippers come in small, medium and large and in burgundy, hunter green and beige colours.

"We get a lot of mothers writing to the Web site who tell us their children's feet are so cold they turn purple and the slippers have really made a difference."

Ms Kotack will feature her slippers at the 27th annual One of a Kind Christmas Ms Kotack recommended wearing a thin Show at the National Trade Centre, Exhibition Place in Toronto. The show will take place November 22 to December 2.
