

Town councillors to get annual pay hike of 3 per cent

In an attempt to avoid large time-to-time remuneration hikes, town councillors approved a policy Monday that will see their pay increase in annual increments.

Pay raises will now be based on increases received by non-union Town staff members — a recommendation that came from the Citizens Committee on Council Remuneration's report to council in April, 2000.

"In considering compensation adjustments for non-union staff in Milton, staff does give consideration to the Ontario cost of living index and compensation adjustments in other communities," Director of Corporate Services Jim McQueen said in a report to council.

adjustment for council compensation, their remuneration will tend to stay current and not be subject to major increases whenever the major citizen's review is done again."

Currently, councillors receive an annual remuneration of \$13,500, while the mayor (the only full-time member of council) receives \$40,180. Those salaries will see a 3 per cent increase next year based on the new policy.

But the raises don't mean new money for council members, Mayor Gord Krantz told The Champion. The raises keep their pay up-to-date, he said.

"There is no increase in pay, it just balances out the rate of inflation. If you don't at least include the rate of inflation, you go ahead backwards," Mr. Krantz continued.

"What happens with elected officials is a lot of them are afraid to deal with remuneration because it is a controversial issue. But they get so far behind when they do have to deal with it that it looks worse. In the name of fairness, I think it was appropriately dealt with by the Citizens' Committee recommendation."
