


Good News! The Canadian Champion has started two routes in the newly developed neighbourhoods at the south-east end of town. More routes to follow in due course.



I had to wait until the ticker seller finished her conversation; stood at the counter waiting to be served for five minutes with no other customers there because I wasn't standing in the right spot; heard one of the workers burp loudly as he walked by; stood in front of the counter with the floor so sticky l could barely move my feet; waited while the counter person came back several times to check on the order (popcorn and a drink); and then gave my ticket to a slouched over person who grunted at me. And this was a good day.

It's not so bad everywhere. I find that grocery stores are good, as well as restaurants where they have tips in mind, hardware chains, and shops were only one teenager is working.

I don't blame the teens, I blame the people who train them or watch over them. You tell them what to do and make sure they do it. If they don't, you send them on their way to the other major chain.

Recently, I ordered something at a large

coffee chain. She got everything I ordered without coming back to check two or three times. I was impressed and gave her a tip. Then I thought about it, I was impressed because somebody did what they were supposed to do?

In most cases, it would take five minutes to train somebody to do these jobs. But, they're kids and often this is their first venture into the work force. Teens can be clueless at times, I remember it well. I'm still clueless sometimes with work.

One store was so good with their teenage help that I sought out the owner to tell him. It was a couple years ago, but the service I got was outstanding.

I'm not against teenagers having fun while they work. But, they have to keep in mind that they're there to do a job. If they make mistakes, that's fine, I'm not an ogre, but rudeness and poor manners shouldn't be tolerated.

That's why I'm going to give all teens and their managers my special 10-second course in how handle the public. Look at the customer, smile at the customer, and be pleasant. Your training is finished.


