
The Under 12 Project (see page 8) is another in a series of pro-active policing methods that see police trying to head off trouble rather than react to incidents. And for that, we should all be grateful.

From our point of view, the \$185,000 in federal funding that's permitting the program to begin, is taxpayers' money well spent.

Many people aren't great fans of the current Young Offenders Act, but the proposed Young Criminal Justice Act, which is expected to become law next year, should do much to deal with leniency and other issues. It will encourage more 'diversion' programs to keep kids out of our legal system and get them back on track before the die is cast for a life of criminal acts.

In the Under 12 Project, police hope to reach boys in 90 families a year.

We wish all involved in the Under 12 Project great success — especially the boys.

options available with respect to the possible locations of each of the proposed Town Hall additions, the central library and in particular a performing arts centre.

Conspicuously missing from this discussion was the acknowledgement of the historical value of our existing downtown core.

Given the substantial investment in renovation costs by residents and business owners over the past 20 — and the fact that communities such as Kitchener/Waterloo, Guelph and Oakville locate their cultural centres in the historical area of town — it seemed unusual they would consider a location at Main Street and Thompson Road.

There's only one appropriate site for our arts and cultural centre and that's the east parking lot of the Town Hall.

The Town Hall should continue to operate with additional office space being built on the site of the old police station, with the

women's residence moved to the Allendale area. There's still room for the arts and cultural centre and the remaining area would still provide selected parking for Town staff. The Town would argue there's insufficient parking. However, when you consider performances at the centre take place in the evening, after business hours and many shoppers have left the area, there would be ample parking available.

On November 8, I wrote the Toronto Consultants EDA Collaborative, expressing my concerns and offering this approach to the location of the arts and cultural centre for their consideration.

We have an opportunity to support our historical community and our downtown business, which we must not overlook.

It's time to come together on this important issue by writing, phoning and faxing our town councillors to encourage them to support us in our efforts to maintain the cultural continuity and prosperity of this unique community.
