After giving up three first-period goals at home versus Flamborough Saturday, Milton's AA major atom puckstopper has slammed the door on the opposition — giving up just one more marker in two-and-two-third games to help turn the tide on opening round play.

Brian Hunter continued to flourish on defense — as he has on most nights since dropping back from the wing — while leading offensively in the game three shutout win with two goals was Scott Stover.


