Pepper also stood out with three assists while between the pipes was Robert Smith.


The bantams — who followed their midget counterparts in sweeping the first round in four nights - now face the Flamborough Sabres.

## 'A' midgets suffer surprising game one loss to Georgetown

Thirteen minutes into the night and down 3-0.

Milton's A midgets hadn't experienced anything even remotely resembling this type of scenario during regular season play against the basement-dwelling Georgetown Raiders.

But too much confidence and not enough effort can make for rather shocking results. The Winterhawks learned that first-hand at Memorial Arena Saturday.

Beginning OMHA playdown action as the distinct favourite versus the traditionally pushover Raiders, Milton offered a lacklustre start and consequently was taken for three goals inside a two-and-a-half minute span late in the first period.

Josh Caswell, Milton's most reliable sniper, cut into the visitors' lead late in the second on a short-range wrister off the draw. Tim Anderson would then draw his team within one by barreling into the slot and going upstairs with about four minutes left to play.

Georgetown continued to protect their lead like it was pure gold and finally cemented the win with an empty-net deposit from its own blueline.

Each side had just one powerplay and neither capitalized on it. Shots on goal favoured Milton 37-25.

The Raiders' game one victory was only their third in league play this season.




