# 'AA' midgets net second straight sweep in OMHA playoff action

The Milton AA midget Winterhawks were odds-on favourites to win the third game of their series against Oakville on Super Bowl Sunday, and that's exactly what they did.

The 4-0 victory gave them a sweep and put them into the OMHA quarter-finals against the winner of the Brampton and Georgetown series.

A 2-1 win in Oakville on Friday night on goals by captain Connor Sweeney and Scott McLaughlin in front of netminder Kyle Goertz, set the stage for the Super Bowl day sweep.

After the opening kick-off, or face-off, the two teams took turns feeling each other out, meaning that nothing much happened until midway through the period.

He spied Szafer waiting calmly alone by the side of the net and sent him a perfect spiral.

The unofficial scoring chances at the end of the period were Milton 12 and Oakville 0. The shots were 17-2 for Milton.

Milton goaltender Jason Strong may have been watching the Super Bowl in a small television hidden in his glove, because he didn't need to watch the hockey game.

The hustle and second effort by Milton made it appear as if they were playing a last place team, although Oakville finished only two points behind Milton in the regular season standings. Milton was 19-7-2, while Oakville was 18-8-2.

They buzzed the Rangers' defensemen and took the puck off them with regularity. Whenever Oakville even threatened to come close to the Winterhawks net, the Milton defense built up an invisible wall to keep them out.

#### Close early on

The only worrisome part was that Milton only had a 1-0 lead at the end of the first period when they could have been up 7-0. At this point, the odds were 2-5 that Milton would score more goals, 3-1 that Strong would fall asleep in net, 10-1 against Oakville scoring, and 3-1 that a hustling Chris Coates would score a goal.

Coates was the Winterhawks version of Charlie Hustle, although unlike Pete Rose, Coates presumably wasn't betting on the

Oakville did turn it on some in the second period, and during one flurry, the unofficial scoring chances jumped from 15-0 to 15-4, forcing Strong to earn his shutout.

Ricci put an end to that when he broke through some tacklers and went in alone, tucking a backhand upstairs.

Late in the period, Coates, Kyle Burrell

and Adam Rutz broke up the ice after a Milton penalty ended, and while Oakville put up a valiant goal-line stand, they kept banging away until Rutz finally put it in.

The score at the end of the second period was 3-0, the same score at the time that St. Louis was leading New England in the Super Bowl.

The bookies were set to pay off on the Coates odds when he found himself alone in front of the net, deked the goalie out of the way, but then plastered a backhand between the uprights, over the net. No points were awarded.

An observer might have given the game pucks to Szafer, Ricci, and Coates, but coach, Arnie Parcels would have given it to the entire team, especially in the series. "We outworked them one-on-one in all three games."

That was the gameplan: "Outwork the other team every shift and win the little battles. Everything else takes care of itself."

The tight discipline of the Winterhawks was also a factor, which is non-negotiable, according to Parcels. "That's the rule if they want to play on this team. It's the difference between winning and losing. Discipline is doing the right thing."

That might have been exactly what the New England Patriots were saying after their surprise Super Bowl victory.
