### Jury recommendations must be taken seriously

We're sure the dedicated staff at Halton Women's Place are hoping that this time around the government will listen (and act upon) the 58 recommendations that came out of the Gillian Hadley inquest.

Ms Hadley, 35, was shot to death by her estranged husband in June 2000. Ralph Hadley, who was ordered to stay away from his wife, then turned the gun on himself.

Ms Hadley didn't have to die. Like other women killed in similar tragedies, there was an obvious pattern of violence — so blatantly obvious in fact, that one of the police officers involved in the case predicted the worst.

How many more women must die at the hands of a violent partner before the laws say this isn't just? How many more women must suffer because the social safety net just isn't big enough or doesn't cover every inch of the province?

If only there were tougher bail laws and easier access to subsidized housing for families fleeing domestic violence. And it's precisely these ideas that have been dealt with by the inquest jury.

The jurors did a good job. They deserve to see their recommendations taken seriously.

To make this a truly well-planned and attractive town, it would be wise to maintain an emphasis on the historic downtown district where there's already a full complement of amenities, especially fabulous restaurants and shops. People like to do something before or after a performance, especially going for a bite to eat. All these facilities could be concentrated around or near the beautiful Town Hall. If need be, a municipal department (building and planning) could be located in another location such as Main Street and Thompson Road, which is near construction activity.
