

Sisters help Brampton club move up four spots from '01

There was no coming home empty-handed this time around.

Determined to rebound from last year's disappointing seventh-place finish at the junior synchronized skating nationals, the Brampton Gold Ice club which includes Milton sisters Alicia and Melissa Visconti — fortified its collective efforts earlier this month in Kitchener.

And in doing so, the 20-member unit — in just their third year of existence — jumped up four spots to capture bronze.

Said 15-year-old Alicia, "I never cried so hard in my life. It was just amazing."

The Viscontis' Gold Ice contingent beat out eight teams, several of which are much more established, to reach the podium.

They missed the silver — which would have earned them a trip to worlds — by only a few points.

Quebec's Les Supremes took second-place honours while securing the gold was Burlington Ice Image.

Brampton was a model of consistency during the two-day national showcase, grabbing third spot for their short program and then matching that placing with their lengthier routine.

"I think we were more focused this year," said 17-

year-old Melissa. "We just performed for ourselves and didn't worry about medals. We skated from our hearts and just tried to do the best we could. That's how we approached every competition this season."

Their philosophy certainly met with favourable

results. Gold Ice reached the podium in five of six events and struck gold three times - including at the Tri State International last month in Michigan, where the girls delivered near-flawless execution in their final tune-up to nationals.

Remarked Alicia, "There were a lot of new girls this year, but we really came together as a team."

That cohesion, she noted, had a lot to do with newlyappointed coaches Jodie Jones and Stephanie Klein who helped skipper Wendy Degraaf implement a whole new routine that features more challenging open blocks, in which skaters cross through one another without using their arms.

"The new coaches really helped," added Melissa.

Brampton's medal-winning performance affords the team an international assignment for next season likely to a competition in Europe.

In the meantime, the girls will close out this season with a few exhibition performances later this month, including one at the Air Canada Centre during intermission at an NHL oldtimer's game on Easter Sunday.

Two nights earlier against Flamborough, the Winterhawks had a last-minute goal waved off that would have allowed them to squeak out the win. Instead, they had to settle for a 1-1 stalemate.

Brayden Abraham and Brian Hunter set up Kyle Johnson for the lone tally.

Prestidge was rock solid in the cage.

Milton travels to Guelph tomorrow night and close out round-robin play at home against Ancaster Sunday afternoon.
