Milton Bicycle Club formed to help increase interest in cycling in town and vicinity

'Time Capsules' are gems of information extracted from past issues of The Champion and other publications to provide a window into Milton's past. Explanatory comment is sometimes provided to place the situation in context.

April 1895


Through the kindness of the trustees of the Old Kirk of Scotland (then at 62 Main St. later moved to Mill St. and converted to a house), the Church of England services will be held there for the present.

May 1895

The Milton Bicycle Club was organized last night and a very successful meeting was held. The following officers were elected: President E.W. Boyd, Vice-President John Dewar, Secretary-Treasurer W. H. Wilson, Capt. W.F. Dewar, 1st Lieut. E. Yates, 2nd Lieut. A. Armstrong. The club will help to increase the interest in cycling in the town and vicinity, as they will likely have a series of races during the season. The first club run will be held on Tuesday evening, 21st inst., leaving the town hall at 7 p.m.

The programme for Tuesday June 4th when Lord Aberdeen will visit Milton to lay the corner stone of Grace Church, has been arranged. His Excellency will arrive from Toronto by special C.P.R. train at 1 p.m. and will be met by the mayor and council of the town who will present him with an address of welcome at the station. The vice-regal party will then proceed to Judge McGibbon's residence (later Gordon Home now demolished corner Court and Main) for luncheon. The ceremony of the laying of the stone will take place at 2.30. At 3.15, at the town hall, addresses will be presented by the Bishop of Niagara on behalf of the clergy and laity of the rural deanery of Halton, and by the warden and council of Halton. His Excellency and Lady Aberdeen will then hold a reception at the town hall, when the citizens of Halton and neighborhood will have an opportunity to be presented. Tea will be served at the town hall, by the ladies of the church, from 4.30 to 6 p.m. An entertainment, the proceeds of which will be appropriated for the building fund, will commence at 8 o'clock. Negotiations are in progress for special excursion rates on the C.P.R. and G.T.R. from Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph, Brampton and Galt and intermedi-

ate points to Milton and no doubt they will be successful. The town council has appointed a decoration committee, the church grounds will be decorated by another committee appointed by the congregation and the town may be expected to present a gay appearance.

Milton is busy preparing for Lord and Lady Aberdeen's visit next Tuesday to lay the corner stone of Grace Church. The town council has appointed a decorative committee who will have a handsome arch erected in front of the town hall and will supply evergreens free of charge to those who wish to decorate their houses or grounds. Landlord Dean, of the Commercial, will erect an arch on Main St. opposite his hotel. Another decorative committee has been appointed by the congregation of Grace Church and will see that the church grounds are suitably adorned with evergreens, flags and perhaps an arch. Dinner will be served at the town hall by the ladies of Grace Church from 12 to 1 o'clock and tea from 4.30 to 6 p.m. Citizens or visitors who wish to be presented to Lord and Lady Aberdeen at the reception, which they will hold at the town hall after the presentation of addresses, will need only to be ready at the time and place and to give their names to the A.D.D. who will accompany the vice-regal party. A handsome silver trowel has been secured for the use of Lord Aberdeen in laying the corner stone and is on exhibition at Thos. Wilson's shoe store on Main street. As tickets to Milton will be issued at a single fare on the C.P.R. at Toronto, Galt and Guelph and all intermediate points and on the G.T.R. from London, Hamilton, Caledon East, Guelph, Galt and intermediate points good to return on June 5 it is expected that there will be a large number of visitors and if the weather be favorable the day will be a notable one in the history of Milton and of this county. (In later issues it was reported three to four thousand attended the laying of the corner stone.)
