

Founder of the Gorrud Auto Group, Jim





Five local businesses have risen to the top this year, receiving nominations for the Milton Chamber of Commerce Business of the Year awards.

Nominations are split between two categories; 25 employees or less and more than 25 employees.

#### 25 employees or less

Candidates in the 25 employees or less category include La Rose Italian Bakery, Two-Stage Innovation and McKersie-Kocher Funeral Home — spokespersons for all of which said the nomination caught them off guard.

"I was surprised to have our company nominated. We're an industrial automation and robotics company and the other nominees are more known publicly than we are," offered Terry Sharp, president of Two-Stage Innovations.

Two-Stage is a relative newcomer to Milton, starting up in 1998 with eight employees.

Since then, demand for products has lead to an increased staff of 17.

The company was also recently ranked 22nd on the list of 'Canada's Hottest Start-ups' by PROFIT magazine.

La Rose co-owner Maggie Lizzi told The Champion she heard of the nomination after returning from a holiday --- a pleasant homecoming, she said.

"It was a complete shock."

The bakery has been a long-time staple of the White Oaks Plaza on Bronte Street. Ms Lizzi and her husband, Cosimo, purchased the bakery in 1982 and have expanded twice within the plaza.

The McKersie-Kocher Funeral Home is also a long-time operator in town -- having been founded by Lachie McKersie in 1953.

When Doug and Judy Kocher purchased the business in 1977, they decided to keep the established McKersie name and add their own.

"It's a family-owned, family-operated business and we've put a lot of our time into the business. It's nice to see that recognized," commented son Andrew Kocher.

#### More than 25 employees

The two companies nominated in the 25 or more employees category include a local manufacturer and one of Milton's busiest residential developers.

Roxul Inc. has been manufacturing insulation in town since 1988 and has grown to include 143 employees.
