Milton rep hockey program makes a major comeback, thanks to changes

And the award for comeback of the year goes to... Milton minor hockey.

Last season was a dreadful year for the rep teams in Milton. Most of the teams were cellar dwellers in their leagues, the playoffs were a complete bust, and one measly team had a record over .500.

A number of suggestions were made as to the reason for the drop in quality, the most common being that the population had aged because there hadn't been any new development for so long. The future would be brighter it was thought, but not for a while.

It didn't take long at all. One year to be exact.

In the regular season in the AA age group of Tri-County, the midgets were 19-7-2, the most wins in the league; the bantams were 14-10-4, good for fourth place; the peewees had a winning record; and the atoms were 13-7-2. Some other teams didn't fare so well, but overall an excellent showing.

In A, the midgets had a winning record, in AE, three of four teams had winning records, including a 14-7-3 mark by the bantams and a 15-6-3 record by the atoms.

In the playoffs there was yet more success. In AA, the midgets are now playing in the OMHA finals, the AA bantams went to the OMHA semifinals, and several other teams were successful.

In the Tri-County playoffs two teams have already qualified for the finals — the atom AA and minor atom AA.

Pretty impressive stuff, and it was no accident. And almost none of it was the result of kids moving into the new developments in Milton.

Tammie Parcels, vice-president in charge of the rep program, took the time to explain some of the changes from last year, as well as deflect the credit to several other people.

There was an increased focus on coach and player development to start, which included hosting more clinics. She said they increased the level of communication, and determined from coaches what they needed and what they felt wasn't being provided to them.

As well, they were able to place the proper

coaches at the appropriate age levels.


One result from the increased communication was that rep teams were allowed to carry fewer players this year, meaning weaker players weren't on teams because they had to be to meet the number requirement.

Joey Pedulla, a former Junior and European professional, helped with the tyke to peewee ages; Grant Gooding took over player and coach development, with help from Dan Vipond, and did a tremendous job according to Parcels. She also mentioned the help of Scott Anders and others that contributed to the increased success that extended all the way down to house-league where vice-president Mike White was responsible for several successful changes.

More changes are in store for next year, but the one year turnaround is a tremendous achievement in itself.

We can count ourselves fortunate in Milton that there are people to take the initiative to create better programs for our kids, with little fanfare or thanks.
