Decision on red-light cameras deferred until Nov.

Low number of Halton motorists caught running red lights in first year of provincial pilot project

Who would've guessed that Halton residents were such a cautious and law-abiding bunch?

Although the Region's controversial red-light camera caught 233 vehicles running red lights in its first year of operation, it mostly served to prove that Halton drivers are a pretty responsible

Of the six municipalities participating in a provincial pilot program to study the red-light camera technology, Halton had the lowest rate of charges per camera.

While the Region's one camera, rotating through four intersections, nabbed 233 red-light runners, each camera operating in Hamilton caught 2,412 red-light runners.

The provincial average for the first year of the pilot program was 1,208 charges per camera.

Patrick Murphy, the Region's commissioner of planning and public works, couldn't explain at Wednesday's committee meeting why the statistics are so much lower for Halton.

"We must have more law-abiding citizens, that's all I can say," he laughed.

Mr. Murphy did suggest the volume of traffic

at busy intersections in Halton may provide enough deterrent to stop drivers from running

As a result of the low number of violators, the red-light camera may disappear from Halton in November, when the two-year pilot project wraps up.

While the five other municipalities participating in the pilot project have asked for a two-year extension of the program, Halton staff are suggesting the Region wait until November to make a decision on participating in any further use of the cameras.

Basically, said Mr. Murphy, the Region's results are contributing little statistically to the provincial database.

He added the yearly cost of \$125,000 to \$150,000, which pays for the cost of moving and monitoring the camera, laying and pursuing

charges and recording all data, might be better spent on other safety initiatives.

Participating municipalities are also required to monitor two intersections where red-light cameras aren't operating, to provide compar-

That requires dedication of police resources that might be better used elsewhere, Mr. Murphy

By next spring, the Province is expected to have the results of the pilot program analyzed, including the impact of the red-light cameras on reducing collisions.

While Halton may not choose to participate further in the pilot program, that wouldn't preclude the Region from using red-light cameras in the future, if provincial legislation permits, added Mr. Murphy.


