Winterhawks deliver decisive shutout win in game two

Kyle Goertz earned his second straight shutout for the midget AA Winterhawks Tuesday night at Memorial Arena.

But this time around, perfection between the pipes was simply a bonus rather than a necessity. That's because his teammates — who required flawless cage work and an overtime deposit to clinch the semifinals - beefed up their offensive efforts and brushed aside the Barrie Flyers 5-0 to take a two-games-to-none lead in the best-of-seven OMHA finals.

In front of another sizable crowd, the hosts struck before the contest was two minutes old and then put a hammerlock on the proceedings with three secondperiod goals — including a shorthanded backbreaker by Julian Ricci.

The Milton Toyota Winterhawks — currently riding a four-game win streak — spent much of period three killing penalties, but afforded their guests nothing even closely resembling a legitimate comeback window.

Kyle Burrell, Mark Galick and Michael Winiarz all

had a goal and an assist while also scoring was Chris Coates — who along with Scott McLaughlin and Brett Turner did a highly credible job turning back the visitors' powerplay.

Captain Connor Sweeney drew a pair of assists while single helpers were recorded by McLaughlin, Derek Blanchard and Adam Rutz.

Although not quite stealing the show like he did in game five against Stoney Creek, Goertz was every bit as sharp in a somewhat less demanding performance Tuesday. He made a couple of dynamite glove saves early on and persevered his goose egg down the stretch with a lightning-quick toe block.

Milton chased the opposing starter from the net with three goals on eight shots in the middle stanza and overall out-shot the Flyers 26-24.

The AA midget squad — now the flagship of the local hockey scene — travels to Barrie tomorrow afternoon for game three. If victorious, the Winterhawks will have a chance to sweep the championship series at Memorial Arena Sunday at 8 p.m.

If necessary, game five will be played in Barrie Tuesday.


Tim Johnston and Nathaniel Murray split the netminding duties last weekend and were both solid to keep things close.

whitewash over Hamilton.


Mott earned the shutout and was named tournament MVP.
