Bertoli's Titans tops in ECHL Northeast

Miltonian number one scorer on Trenton

Scott Bertoli's Trenton Titans had a lot to live up to this season.

And so far, they've risen to the challenge
— sitting on the verge of an overall second-place finish in the East Coast Hockey
League.

With three games remaining, the team has clinched top spot in the ECHL Northeastern Conference with a record of 44-16-9.

The Titans' latest victory came against their as of now first-round opponent, Roanoke Saturday. Bertoli — like most games this season — helped fuel the victory with a goal and an assist, to celebrate his 25th birthday.


Tops in team scoring

Milton's former junior and university star currently sits atop team scoring and top-20 overall in the league with 23 goals and 68 total points. His plus/minus mark of 27 also ranks among the league's best.

"I started slow again this year, but about 20 games in I got two new young linemates with a lot of energy and we began creating a lot of chances," explained the point-agame left winger, now a third-year veteran of the ECHL.

While both of those linemates later moved up to the AHL, Bertoli continued to flourish and earlier this month earned his own promotion — albeit a short-lived one — to Calgary Flames' AHL affiliate in St. John, New Brunswick.

"I knew it was only going to be for one

game, but I thought I played pretty well. I got quite a bit of play," said Bertoli of his third one-game stint in the AHL.

"I thought I should have gotten a lengthier stay (in AHL) this season, obviously

that's what I'm hoping for. Maybe next season."

In the meantime, another productive play run will certainly put the former Milton Merchant and Princeton Tiger in good stead with AHL scouts.

Last season he was among the standouts in the Titans' drive to the league championship — where they were finally ousted by South Carolina.

Bertoli figures another berth to the ECHL Kelly Cup—despite Trenton's rash of personnel changes, due to call-ups and injuries—is not out of the question.

"We're definitely capable of another lengthy playoff run," he said.

"We should be there at the end. Another strong playoff performance will certainly help me. I think (last year's showing) is what helped me get the tryout with Washington (Capitals)."

Trenton takes on Richmond tomorrow night and closes out regular-season play this weekend with a home-and-home series against Atlantic City.

A Fair and Reasonable Offer

The Government of Ontario has offered OPSEU members a fair and reasonable wage offer over three years. This offer is similar to those already accepted by other Ontario public service unions. OPSEU has rejected this offer and is now on strike. The Government remains available to return to the table at any time.

The Government's offer includes:

An up to 10 per cent raise for all staff over a three-year contract made up of:

- a 5.96 per cent raise for all staff over a three-year contract;
- a one per cent raise in the first year in exchange for productivity and efficiency gains; and
- an overall raise of three per cent over three years for staff who are at the maximum of their salary ranges, based on performance. Some 70 per cent of OPSEU staff are currently at the maximum of their salary grid and would be eligible for this increase.

In addition:

- an immediate 10 per cent raise for nurses;
- an immediate eight per cent raise for ambulance dispatchers;
- o an immediate eight per cent raise for scientists;
- additional compensation to Waste and Water Treatment Operators and mechanics employed by the Ontario Clean Water Agency to recognize credentials upgrading;
- an increase in shift premiums for non-correctional employees to 78 cents per hour for hours worked between 5 p.m. and 7 a.m. to better reflect market rates; and
- a one per cent pay-for-performance pool for employees who are at the maximum of their salary ranges.
