UNH's 4-3 win over Cornell and Maine's identical victory against Boston University Sunday set the stage for a Frozen Four semifinal showdown between these Hockey East juggernauts next Thursday, April 4 in St. Paul, Minnesota.


Haydar drew a pair of assists in their initial playoff clash two weeks ago — which fueled the Wildcats' 3-1 Hockey East title triumph — and did likewise against Cornell Sunday.

Continuing to thrive on the powerplay, he helped set up both first-period goals by gifted linemate Colin Hemingway.

Unlikely UNH hero Jim Abbott scored with under three minutes in regulation to pull of the win.

Former Georgetown Raider Michael Knoepfli had two assists the previous night to help Cornell beat Quinnipiac 6-1 in the NCAA Tournament's opening round.

Haydar's Wildcats lost to Maine 3-2 in overtime in the national finals in 1999 and will no doubt be looking for a little payback next Thursday.




Gleed, a sophomore defenceman
