MILTON MILTON Under-serviced

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As an under-serviced community, Milton representatives have the opportunity to take their recruitment efforts right to the source — Ontario's five medical schools. In addition to offering town tours and talking to interested graduates, every graduating individual receives an information brochure telling them what Milton has to offer.

One of the biggest selling points is location, said Mr. Oliver. Being in the Greater Toronto Area but still a significantly rural community, Milton has a lot to offer. "As far as I know, Milton is the closest underserviced community to Toronto. There's good access to the city, people can grab the GO Train and return to a small town."

Recruitment incentives - offered by

HHS — also provide up to \$10,000 for doctors to relocate and a \$30,000 interest-free loan to establish their practice. Loans must be repaid within three years.

Milton's biggest obstacle to physician recruitment has been a lack of available office space, Mr. Oliver pointed out, adding the opening of the Commercial Street Professional Building last fall helped the situation.

"We were looking at developing a medical site on the Milton hospital property, but we're deferring it until the Commercial Street building is completely occupied," he stated. "If other private sector doesn't create the space as physicians need it, the (HHS) board of directors will again come back to looking at developing on the hospital site."
