

Local woman musters up more courage than she knew she had in recent battle with cancer

Family and friends were instrumental in her fight

Theena Cameron wasn't going to let cancer get the better of her.

Her world was shattered November, 1999, after the lump she discovered in her right breast was diagnosed as cancerous.

"I could feel it (lump). I went to the doctor and I was immediately sent to the surgeon.

"A biopsy was done and the lump turned out to be cancerous. I had the operation to remove the tumor the following week."

Even when she found the lump, the thought of cancer never crossed her mind, she said.

"I don't have one bit of (cancer) history in my family. I was in shock."

Surgeons removed the tumor and a small amount of lymph nodes.

"The surgeon said I probably had the lump for a while but I never felt different until that day I found it. I had a mammogram that year and nothing showed

After surgery, Ms Cameron went through "aggressive" chemotherapy, a chemical treatment used to kill off the body's cells.

"I had one injection every three weeks," she recalled. "It wasn't pleasant but I think I was lucky. I knew I was going to lose my hair. You don't think it's a big deal until it actually happens."

Lengthy treatment

When the chemotherapy treatment was complete, she then went through six weeks of radiation treatment.

"I had 20 minutes of radiation every day. It was very tiring because I had to go in every single day."

Now living cancer free, Ms Cameron looks back on her nine months of turmoil with a new found love for life.

"I think I was really lucky because I had a lot of support," the Milton resident said, adding it takes a full five years to be in the clear of the disease.

"My family tried to do things as normally as we could when I was going through treatment. It really helped."

Besides the unconditional support from her family, Ms Cameron managed to personally keep her spirits high during treatment.

"I didn't want it to happen to me but something worse could have happened. I could have been kept



April is Cancer Awareness Month. According to the Canadian Cancer Society, women between the ages of 50 and 69 should


have a mammogram once every two years. Women should watch for changes in their breasts, including lumps, puckered or dimpled skin, bleeding or discharge from the nipples. More than 85 per cent of lumps found aren't cancerous.
