
Plant should clear up town's brown water woes

The brown water that has plagued certain areas of town for years should soon be history.



At its April 25 meeting, the Conservation Halton (CH) board of directors approved the construction of a water treatment plant to be built at Kelso Conservation Area.

The treatment plant, proposed by Halton Region, has full support of CH staff.

"This facility is definitely necessary," CH CEO Theresa Maguire-Garber told The Champion.

"That's why we support it whole heartily. Milton residents deserve clean water."

Medium-sized building

The station — to be built adjacent to the Kelso wells and pumping station — will resemble a medium-sized maintenance building.

Construction is expected to begin in August and will be completed by next spring, said Bruce Kitchen of the Region's planning and public works department.

"Milton has an ongoing problem with the dirty water issue," he said, adding the cost of the \$5 to \$6 million facility was

approved in the Region's 2002 budget in December.

"We've pin-pointed it as a manganese problem and this plant will be capable of stripping it away."

Tenders for the project will be sought in June, Ms Maguire-Garber said.

Martin Street resident Donald Baldwin, whose home has been plagued with brown water for years, said he's happy to hear plans for the water treatment plant is finally getting underway.

"It came down to cost and the question of allocating funds. I think this should have been done quite a while ago."

He said Region staff installed two water filters in his home about eight months ago, which has cleared up the brown water problem.

"It's helped a lot. It's (brown water) has been an on and off problem up here for a couple years."

Milton's brown water problem stems back to 1995, when well six came into production.

The well contained a high concentration of manganese, which is said to pose no health risk at moderate levels.


