Committee passes motion to address pesticides

The public must be made aware of the potential risks associated with pesticide use in landscaping, Halton's health and social services (HSS) committee said Tuesday.

"The data clearly shows that we need to be concerned about the potential for subtle, longterm effects due to exposure (to pesticides)," said Dr. Bob Nosal, Halton's medical officer of health.

"The literature is very suggestive. It does not prove cause and effect. There is enough concern showing that in people exposed to these compounds (pesticides) there is a higher rate of particular tumors."

Committee members approved a lengthy motion outlining the importance of public education and seeking increased research and regulations from both the provincial and federal governments.

The motion comes on the heals of a report from the Halton Intermunicipal Review Committee on the Use of Pesticides. Outlined in the report are the health concerns — such as leukemia, lymphomas, reproductive effects and neurological effects — and how the public feels about pesticide use.

According to Dr. Nosal's presentation to the HSS committee, 61.9 per cent of Halton residents surveyed feel pesticides have a somewhat negative or very negative impact on human health. Survey's further indicate 60.4

per cent of residents somewhat or strongly support a municipal ban on pesticide use for landscaping.

Landscaping accounts for 4 per cent of the pesticides used in the region. Farming operations are the main users of the product.

"One of the things looked at (in reports studied) is if you're spraying it on the lawn, is there a risk of kids or adults being exposed? In a lot of the studies, people would walk in bare feet on the lawn to see how much they would pick up," continued Dr. Nosal.

"The other thing is they'd measure the kids and adults going into the home to see how much was tracked in. There's a lot more concern with what is tracked indoors than what's on the lawn."

On the lawn, there are naturally-occurring mechanisms in the soil and bacteria that break down parts of the pesticides, he explained. Those mechanisms don't exist on hardwood or carpeted floors.

Included in the motion was a request for the area municipalities to develop an education program relating to health issues and pesticide alternatives, that municipalities advocate "behind-the-counter" pesticide sales to the upper tier governments and municipalities consider bylaws placing conditions on pesticide

Regional council hasn't taken a position on the issue, but is expected to comment on the committee recommendations Wednesday.


