Halton MPP Ted Chudleigh has a new position — parliamentary assistant to the minister of finance.

Premier Ernie Eves announced the new list of parliamentary assistants last week. Mr. Chudleigh, whose previous position was parliamentary assistant to the minister of economic development and trade, said he's looking forward to his new post.

"I'm looking forward to working with (Finance Minister) Janet Ecker," said Mr. Chudleigh. "She's dynamic. She's very aggressive. I'm looking forward to that opportunity."

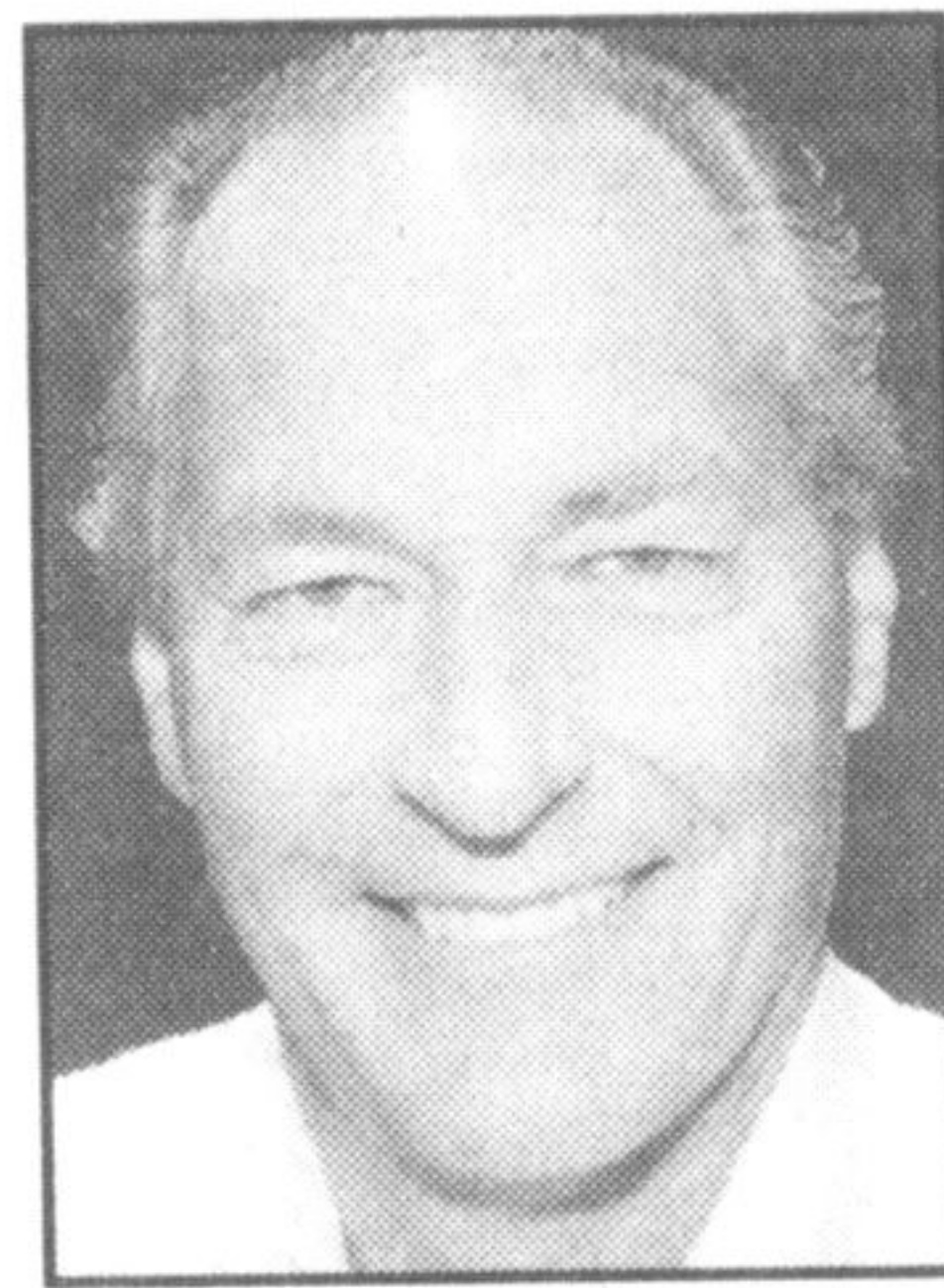
Mr. Chudleigh said he was planning to meet with Ms Ecker to learn more details about his role.

"Finance is one of the major ministries in the Ontario government, and I'm looking forward to being involved in background work on budget processes in Ontario and also working on the specialty areas of angel investing and access to capital for start-up firms," said Mr. Chudleigh.

Premier Eves said each parliamentary assistant will "play a key role in helping members of our cabinet team fulfill their responsibilities more effectively."

"We've carefully chosen people who have the experience, knowledge and ability to help advance the plans and policies that will respond to the needs of the people of Ontario," said Mr. Eves.

Parliamentary assistants' responsibilities may include carrying bills through the house or its committees on behalf of their ministers, leading ministry consultations with the public and taking responsibility for specific programs or policy initiatives.

# About 250 people to do good deeds

"We'll go to about 40 or 50 seniors' homes to rake leaves and clean windows, that type of thing," said Paul Scherer, Milton Community Day committee member. "It's been great in the past. Last year we got about 200 volunteers and this year we're expecting 250. We need every one of them."

A barbecue lunch will be held for the volunteers at Hugh Foster Hall following the clean-up.

"If you can't participate but see them (volunteers) going about their work, give them a wave or a honk to let them know we as a community are grateful for them and their efforts."

# Board considers commercial prospects

Oakville Trustee Drew Currah has convinced his colleagues to have administrative staff do a study on the possibility of incorporating commercial space in new high schools.

At a recent Halton Board of Education meeting, Mr. Currah said he believes the board should be investigating other avenues of fundraising in light of looming operating budget deficits.

Burlington Trustee Peggy Russell agreed with him.

"We're under some extreme fiscal constraints right now. It's time we became a little more proactive in terms of finding additional revenue sources."

Facilities superintendent Gerry Cullen said the board has looked at this issue in the past, noting additional commercial space was built at Iroquois Ridge High School in Oakville.

"This is an idea whose time may have come," said Mr. Papke, "(but) trustees need to have a discussion about the parameters and what kinds of people (groups) we would want in there."

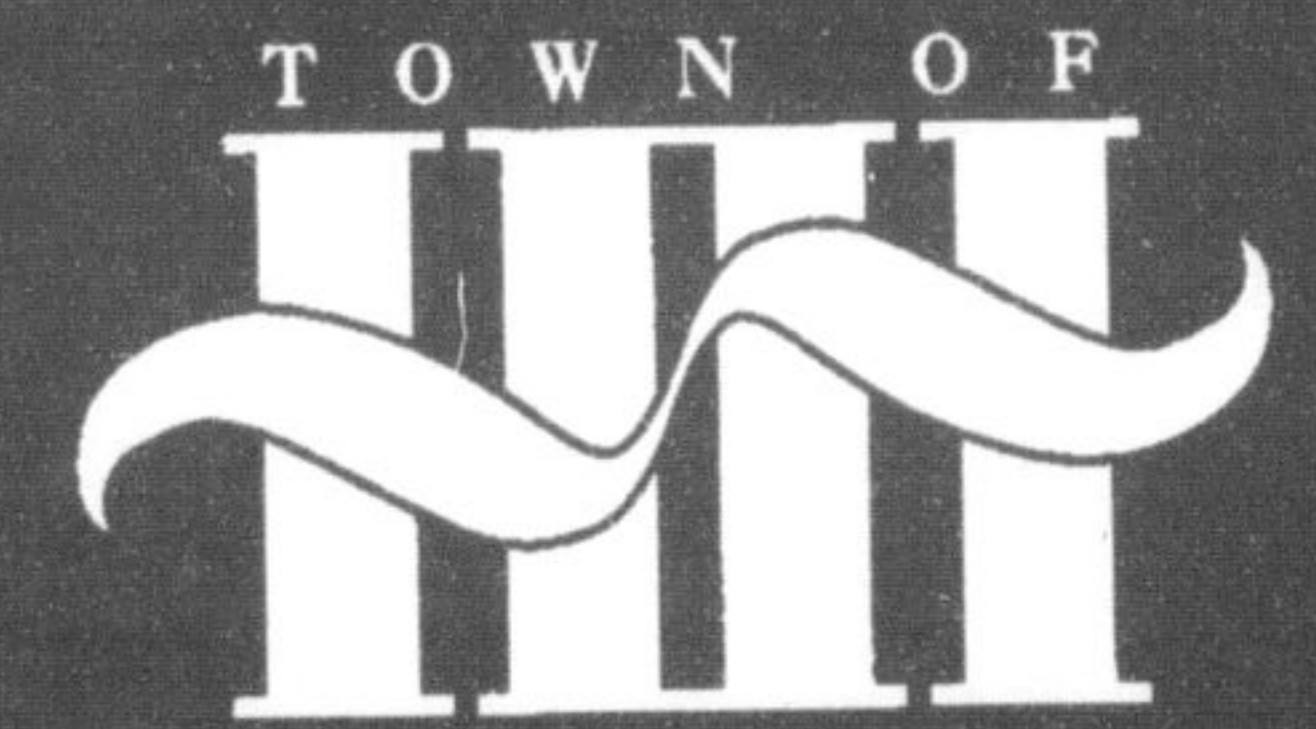

### NOTICE OF A PUBLIC MEETING

A Proposed By-law Amendment for a Golf Course (Expansion) Part of the Southwest Half of Lot 9 Concession 3, Town of Halton Hills (Esqueuing)  
Town of Halton Hills File: D14/Eagle Ridge

General Committee for the Town of Halton Hills will conduct a Public Meeting to examine and discuss an application to permit the establishment of a proposed 9-hole golf course, and associated golf course facilities, located on approximately 40 hectares (100 acres) on the east side of Regional Road (Highway) 25, approximately 550 metres south of No. 10 Side Road as described above and shown on the attached map. This proposed re-zoning application (and associated applications to other approval authorities) has been filed as a 9-hole golf course expansion to an already approved, but not yet built, 18-hole golf course located on lands to the north.

The applicant is seeking various Town of Halton Hills, Regional Municipality of Halton and Niagara Escarpment Commission approvals for the construction of a 27-hole golf course, club house and associated facilities on a total of approximately 115 ha. (284 acres) fronting 1,100 metres on Regional Road (Highway) 25, 1,300 metres on the 10 Side Road and 600 metres on the 3rd Line. The proposed re-zoning application, Rural (RU) - special Zone, is in accordance with the Town of Halton Hills Official Plan - Rural Area designation for these lands. A Regional Official Plan Amendment has also been submitted for the subject lands as well as for other lands located within the Niagara Escarpment Plan area.

If you wish to be notified of the Town of Halton Hills Council decision on the proposed zoning by-law amendment, you must make a written request to the Town of Halton Hills at 1 Halton Hills Drive, Georgetown, Ontario L7G 5G2.

If a person or public body that files a notice of appeal of a decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of the proposed zoning by-law amendment does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Halton Hills before the proposed zoning by-law amendment is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal(s).
